Activity One

Read a selection of poems with the theme of summer.

Has the poet used repetition?

Do the line breaks help the reader?

What language has the poet used to help the reader? Can you find any onomatopoeia, personification, similes or metaphors? How do these help the reader?

Do you like the poem? Why/Why not?

Choose one poem to perform. How will you enhance the poem? Can you add sounds or movement?

Perform your poem to someone in your household - did they enjoy the poem? Think about your own performance; if you were going to perform it again is there anything you would do differently?

Adverbs of Manner

Adverbs of manner answer the question "How"? Adverbs tell us how something happens or happened. Adverbs are *usually* placed after the main verb or object.

adventurously carelessly fiercely nervously angrily foolishly noisily cautiously overconfidently painfully awkwardly cruelly gently powerfully hastily quickly boldly doubtfully lazily calmly easily madly scarily
